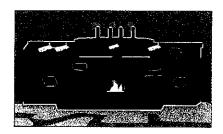

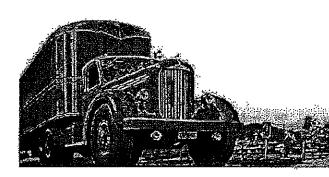

A Letter from the Professor By Allen Millbury

The end of a season (whatever category) always promotes a list of "I've gotta's" stuff which has to be done before the <u>next</u> season. Yeah, that situation has cropped up here, again, of course. The heck of it is that I haven't finished the "I've gotta's" from last season yet!

When I got back here from the last of the 2010 antique truck-tour 'runs'; from Aztec, New Mexico, in mid-September, I put the old International pickup onto the shop's lift and kept it there until I had checked everything I could.



The report, then: Replace rear main bearing seal (the man from Dresden calls that rear main thing, mentioned above, a *berrin*), replace the starter, install new fuel filters, replace master cylinder, lube/oil/check fluids, install new shock absorbers, all corners, re-arch rear springs, add a single leaf, each side, to increase rear height one inch, rotate tires and dump Sta-Bil into the tanks. I hope the old rig is ready, now, for the first trip of 2011, to Plymouth, California, in April.

The mileage rolled up in 2010, including <u>only</u> antique truck functions, came to a bit over 11,000, for that old reprobate. The reason for noting <u>only</u> antique truck <u>functions</u> is that I use the old truck, once in awhile, for no other reason than 'just because'.

An example of an "I've gotta", of long standing: The big brother to the K-1, the 1946 International W-3042-H, also in the shop here, is beginning to look more like a complete unit again. The engine is now right beside the old brute, ready to go in. By the way, that engine was the original power for the Mason Diesel wrecker, BERTHA, the one which was featured in Wheels of Time, July/August 2010.

When Mason Diesel repowered BERTHA with a Cummins BCII, I got the OE unit, a supercharged Cummins 320. That 320 has now been rebuilt, from the crank up. The original engine for the 'W' here was a Cummins 200, badly and seriously wounded and wore out and worse. The early production 'W' trucks were designed to accept several different engines; from two gassers to three diesels to, even... a HUGE Hall-Scott.

When I started to dig into the 'howintheworld'... yeah, that's just one word... of just how to put the 320 into the older 'W' mounts, I found that I was right-into-the-factory's experimental engine mounting attempts. There are/were thirteen pieces in each side of that old truck's rear engine mounts! There was a LOT of soapstone 'figgerin', too, on those pieces.

The result of the several inspections and starts and stops in the conversion from the 'W' factory 200 mounts to the BERTHA 320 mounts was/is a combining of the mounting system from both trucks. BERTHA's rear mounts were <u>below</u> the truck's frame, on the drop-down cross member. The new mounts for the 320 are <u>in the truck's frame</u>, between the flanges. I had to use the 320 bell housing because of the supercharger, otherwise I could have left all of the factory cobbled-up (thirteen) pieces in place, if I could have mounted the 200's bell housing on the 320. Oh, well. Yeah, who made me do it?

I removed the original main and auxiliary transmissions, will use a Roadranger as a replacement. Interestingly, the auxiliary transmission from the 'W' is now in the restored 1949 long-nose Freightliner which Iowa-80 has in their Museum in Walcott. That Freightliner was rebuilt in the Mason Diesel shops here in town.

I have installed front and rear axles from a 1996 IHC Eagle in the 'W', including power steering. The rear axle is the second axle from the Eagle's tandem, and yes, I did retain the air ride.

The 'W' is from among the very first production at the then-new Emeryville, California factory, built right after the close of WWII. I read, somewhere, probably one of Fred Crismon's beautiful books, that the factory folks were slow in getting their foundry 'stuff' set up and running. The upshot of that slow-starting foundry situation made International use some local foundries in the area (San Francisco Bay) for whatever was needed in the way of some of the factory's cast items. Those local foundries were mainly in the business of producing for the seagoing trades, using only brass and bronze because of the horrible rusting properties of iron and steel.

The point, the point: It was 'reported' that some of the early Emeryville trucks were equipped with headlight mounting brackets (trees) which were made of cast bronze; with no mention of how many or what models, of course, of course. When I read of the possibility of cast bronze headlight brackets I went to the shop, got into the crate which held the headlights and brackets and took the combinations into the machine shop. On disassembling the cans from the brackets it appeared, on looking into the bottom of the bracket, when the retainer nut had been removed, that the material might be bronze.

The next step was to use enough persuasion to get down through several years/layers of paint, the persuasion coming from a pedestal mounted wire brush..to see, clearly that BOTH brackets were, indeed cast bronze!

According to the IHC history this particular vehicle was number 57 in the production of the first 'W' models, so it was built in the time that the IHC foundries at Emeryville were still in the planning stages. Interesting, really interesting. I have wondered if I ought to paint the bronze brackets or if they ought to be polished and burnished and made-to-shire. Of course, there was no show in the vehicles of those times, none at all.

I'm rambling, so will quit for now. Be of good cheer and all such stuff.

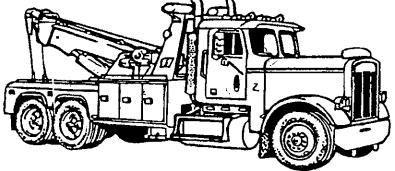
Yesterday the Wreaths Across America convoy left Worcester Wreath in Harrington, Maine with truckloads of Maine Christmas Wreaths bound for veteran's cemeteries around the world. This program was started by Morrill Worcester in 1992 with the donation and laying of 5,000 Maine made Christmas wreaths at Arlington National Cemetery. It has grown into a non profit corporation that lays more than 100,000 wreaths at 300 locations covering all 50 states, Puerto Rico, and 24 cemeteries on foreign soil. Among the national fleets we frequently see on the roads of Maine that volunteer to help with the trucking include; Hartt, Prime, UPS, Fed Ex, Ryder, Perdue, and Wal Mart. Maine base fleets have a strong participation as well with Cianbro, Portland Air Freight and Pottles Transportation volunteering their time and equipment to remember those who gave their lives to protect our freedoms during the Christmas Season.

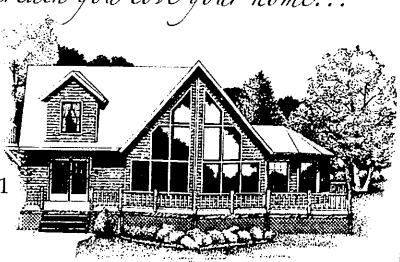
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2011 Pine Tree Chapter Annual Board of Directors' Meeting
